

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

On September 28, 2018, I had the privilege of standing next to County Executive Joe Parisi as he announced 2019 budget initiatives to significantly expand emergency mental health services. NAMI Dane County's advocacy at county budget hearings helped realize a \$320,000 expansion of the emergency mobile mental health crisis program, the addition of the Monona Grove School district as the 11th school-based mental health location for the "Building Bridges" program, and annualization of \$25,000 to continue NAMI Dane County's Crisis Intervention Team and Partner (CIT/P) trainings.

Our advocacy efforts also included participation in NAMI Wisconsin's Action on the Square Day, where representatives of NAMI Dane County shared their personal stories and experiences with the state Senate and House of Representative offices. At the meetings with their legislators, attendees discussed the importance of

identifying mental illness as young as possible, receiving mental health treatment and supportive services, and avoiding the criminal justice system or receiving appropriate, quality services while inside the system.

Providing education and support continues to be at the core of NAMI Dane County's mission. We provided 2,494 individuals and families with much needed information and support through evidence-based or evidence-informed programs like NAMI Family to Family, NAMI Basics, NAMI Ending the Silence for Students, and peer support groups. In 2018, 98% of participants reported increased knowledge and understanding of mental illness, as well as improved coping and problem-solving abilities. These outcomes show the positive impact NAMI Dane County supports and services have on the lives of people affected by mental illness.

NAMI Dane County also announced the launch of two new programs in 2018. We will now offer Crisis Intervention Partner (CIP) training to emergency dispatchers and NAMI Ending the Silence for Teachers - a program to help school staff recognize when their students may be showing signs of a mental illness and how to connect them to appropriate resources.

Our organization's innumerable successes in 2018 show considerable progress in realizing our mission to provide education, support, and advocacy for people affected by mental illness in Dane County.

Thank you for your support in 2018 and we look forward to continuing the work in 2019 and beyond.

ADVOCACY

NAMI Dane County is Dane County's voice on mental illness. We advocate on behalf of those living with mental illness and their families. NAMI promotes solutions to local policy issues by fighting for early intervention, community support services, and access to quality, affordable mental health care. In 2018, NAMI Dane County achieved several advocacy wins in the 2019 county budget, outlined to the right.

Action on the Square

On May 3rd, NAMI Dane County staff and volunteers gathered in Madison to advocate for mental health. This event included a morning session where we learned about legislative issues that affect mental health care, a rally where our advocates made their voices heard by the public, and then one-on-one meetings with Dane County elected officials at the capitol. At the meetings with our legislators, we discussed the necessity of affordable mental health treatment services, transportation in and around our community, and the important role employment plays in recovery.

Miramont Behavioral Health

NAMI Dane County continued to follow progress on the new private psychiatric facility planned for Dane County, Miramont Behavioral Health. Executive Director Lindsay Wallace provided testimony at the April Middleton Plan Commission about how the facility may be helpful in meeting community needs, as well as concerns. While the facility has the potential to divert higher level acuity patients away from the jail, as well as reduce the number of transports to Winnebago (resulting in significant cost-savings to law enforcement and corrections), concerns were raised that Miramont had not begun contract negotiations with local HMOs and health plans. Additionally, NAMI cited concerns over the series of sanctions and violations across other facilities owned by the company, inadequate staffing ratios, and it's ability to take higher level acuity patients regardless of ability to pay. Ultimately, Miramont was awarded a conditional use permit to build the facility and plans to open in mid-summer 2020. This new psychiatric facility continues to be a priority area for NAMI advocacy efforts as we move into 2019 and beyond.

2019 COUNTY BUDGET ADVOCACY WINS

Mental Health's emergency mobile mental health crisis program, where mental health workers visit people in their homes or community sites when experiencing a crisis situation.

Expansion of Building Bridges - a school-based mental health program - to Monona Grove School District. In this program, trained and experienced staff connect students and their families to resources, develop and promote emotional wellness, and provide school staff with professional development consultation on mental health and trauma-related



AWARENESS

Throughout the year, but particularly during Mental Health Month in May, Minority Mental Health Month in July, and Mental Illness Awareness Week in October, NAMI Dane County hosted events to raise public awareness of mental illness and inspire action. Such events fought stigma, provided support, educated the public, and advocated for equal care. Our reach extended further on social media and NAMI Dane County's website, www.namidanecounty.org, as well.







NAMI Dane County's Raise Your Voice Club at West High School hosted a day-long mental health fair during May Mental Health Month. Students learned about the early warning signs of mental illness and how to support a peer. They also learned about community resources available. More than 500 students attended the day-long event to raise awareness about youth mental health in Dane County.

COMMUNITY EVENTS AND OUTREACH

2018 Awards Banquet and Gala

The 2018 Awards Banquet and Gala brought in over 325 mental health supporters at the Monona Terrace Convention Center. NAMI recognized the contributions members of our community made to reduce stigma and improve the lives of people with mental illness and their families. CIT Officer of the Year went to Sgt. Brad Lindsley with the Dane County Sheriff's Office, Jessica Perez from Chrysalis received Outstanding Peer Specialist, the Youth Voice went to Max Blaska, Mental Health Professional of the Year went to Sarah Henrickson with Journey Mental Health, Dennis Hill received the Volunteer of the Year award, and David Wahlberg with the Wisconsin State Journal received the Outstanding Journalist award. With a special keynote address by Judge Everett Mitchell, attendees heard about the decriminalization of mental illness among youth in the juvenile justice system. Dane County youth gave a special musical performance at the end of the event.

Community Information Meetings

NAMI Dane County hosted six community information meetings in 2018. These meetings facilitated thoughtful discussions and increased public awareness about programs and emerging topics related to mental health in Dane County. Some of the topics covered included information on the new private psychiatric facility, Miramont Behavioral Health, navigating special education for youth with mental health needs, NAMI Smarts for Advocacy, and what to expect as a loved one or individual living with mental illness when law enforcement is called during a crisis.

Mind/Game: The Unquiet Journey of Chamique Holdsclaw Movie Screening

During July Minority Mental Health Month, NAMI Dane County hosted a movie screening of *Mind/Game*: *The Unquiet Journey of Chamique Holdsclaw* in partnership with the UW-Madison Psychology Department. The movie intimately chronicles Holdsclaw's athletic accomplishments and personal setbacks with mental illness, and her decision—despite public stigma— to become an outspoken mental health advocate. Following the screening, Board Director Diane Gooding, Ph.D., facilitated a discussion with audience members.

Sequential Intercept Model Workshop

NAMI Dane County worked with mental health and criminal justice agencies to begin mapping out current services, gaps, and opportunities for jail diversion initiatives at the various points an individual with mental illness might interact with the criminal justice system.
